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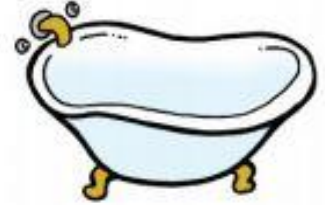

Fun with Rub a Dub Dub

Please help your child learn and remember the Rub a Dub Dub nursery rhyme. To extend your child's learning, you may do the extra shared writing and comprehension activity.

Developmental Areas: literacy, creative arts and fine motor.

Instructions:

This activity was created to have some special time together and to recognize letter sounds. Shared writing is an excellent way to encourage your child to write; especially when working with something that interests them. Your child may be at one of the following stages; scribbling, making letter-like forms or writing discrete letters. Any level they are at is appropriate for this activity. Children develop at their own pace. If your child is willing and able, please encourage them to write.

Your child is not required to do every page. Remember, work at your child's interest and level. Please read the rhyme and directions with your child. As you work on this activity, talk about letter sounds and alliteration (same letter words). You can talk about what a butcher, baker and candlestick maker is. The important thing is to keep it fun and stress free.

When it's all done, please share their finished work with us.
